- Stories help build empathy and connection, to you, to people like you, and to people different than you.










What is Narrative Nonfiction?

Narrative nonfiction is a true story written in the *style* of a novel.







What Narrative Nonfiction is NOT

These nonfiction titles are written to inform you about a topic in an *expository* style.

Nonfiction allows a reader a chance to take deep dives into people, time periods, subjects, etc.



Like fiction, nonfiction is a way to understand a time, place, and people different from your own and to feel a connection to them.







People like to feel better informed, and nonfiction is a way to do that.



Nonfiction is a way to better understand your own history, culture, condition, etc. and to work through your feelings about it.





